COUNSELING "Is a way of Life for a Commissioner"

A. Introduction;

"COUNSELING" - "A way of Life for Commissioners"

Over the years my Scouting Service has been as A Commissioner.

Whether it was Unit Commissioner, Asst. District Commissioner, District Commissioner, Asst. Counsel Commissioner, or Counsel Commissioner in any of these positions there was counseling.

There was never a time when some form of Counseling had not come into play when working with the wonderful Scouters I have met over the 45 years I've served adult Scouter.

It might be only a word of encouragement, "Way to go", you have done a great job, a big smile when they have had success, or an ear to listen with when their problems when it seemed insurmountable in their eyes.

Some of the most fantastic times came when working with the Scouts, with Merit Badges, counseling in their planning sessions, working with NYLT staff members guiding the trough a rough situation where they need a comforting ear to listen, to or help them make a their decision.

When I worked with Cub Pack, Scout Troops, Venture Crews, Wood Badge Staff, NYLT staff, Commissioners College Staff, Commissioners staff, on all these occasions counseling was always used in one form or another.

That is why I have chosen Counseling to write about.

"WHY ARE WE WILLING TO BE A COMMISSIONER?"

"Why Do I Want To Be a Commissioner?"

I have often wondered why people say yes to the question, "Would you like to be a Commissioner?" What is in their makeup that draws them too commissioning? I have observed these qualities in those that choose to take on this responsibility. They want to be with a Pack or Troop or Crew that has people they like. They have wonderful personal people skills, a ready ear to listen. They love the program and want to be a part of making it become a greater success. Or when their son gets involved with scouting so do the parents. Most are people who like the scouting program and realize it is a volunteer program and want to help. Some of these parents might have been a Scout, perhaps a Dad with only girls who had been a scout and now wants to help as a leader. Perhaps a Dad who is an Eagle Scout and now wants to pay back to scouting some time because of his experience and help younger boys on the road to Eagle. Volunteer Leaders are people with these qualities; they love Scouting, they want to be with their friends, they sign up for training as they want to learn more so that they will be able to help their unit.

Commissioners have Fast Start, Commissioner Basic Training, and on to the Commissioner College, and Wood Badge. All of this training will help the commissioner do a better job as a unit commissioner.

When a person agrees to be a commissioner he or she will be recognized as a person who wants to serve the boys in the scouting program. As they grow in this position they will be recognized with awards, the Arrow Head, the Scouters Key, and other awards that are designated for commissioner's awards. Understand these awards come with dedication to the job.

A person that says yes to becoming a commissioner in many cases has had scouting experience and is willing to pass on his/her knowledge to other scouters. It is important to say that other volunteers are more than welcome to join the commissioner's staff if they are willing to learn what the job entails. The new commissioner might be asked to work with more than one unit and they may be reluctant at first, no one want to fail they want to be a success.

Again they will be working with friends and being positive is generally a quality the new person has. They want to help these units they will be working with.

Roundtable - This meeting once a month is to help leaders with program.

I have seen many new scouters who attend a Roundtable Meeting for the first time and they are inspired by what they see. The interaction of the Scoutmasters with other commissioners, Asst. scoutmasters and members of the unit committee such as Committee Chairman, Den leaders, Cub Masters and other members of the Troop or pack committee is fantastic. They have a great time and they pick up many great ideas.

The new scouter comes away from this meeting wanting to learn more about the program. Also after seeing this entire interaction taking place he/she gets a great insight into the job of commissioner. He/she starts to understand why training is so important and why he/she needs to encourage all leaders to get trained.

COMMISSIONER DUTIES

"The IMPORTANCE OF INITIAL TRAINING."

UNIT COMMISSIONERS DUTIES AND INITIAL TRAINING -

The Commissioner has many responsibilities. The first is to see that the units he is serving are successful by earning the Journey to Excellence Gold Award. It is important that his units are using the annual commissioner service plan. This plan is to help the unit organize their programs for the upcoming year. He wants to know each phase of the Scouting program, and be able to describe what each is, and how it works. He reviews all Scouting Program Literature to support and assist the units...

He sees that all his unit leaders take Basic training and Youth Protection.

He visits his units regularly;

- 1. To observe the unit in action, and determine if the literature is being followed and they are sticking to the program.
- 2. He uses the Commissioners work sheet to assess their progress.
- 3. He works with the leadership in conjunction with unit action Plan and completes the unit self-assessment form.
- 4. If he is called upon he helps with some regular activities of the unit.

He visits the unit leaders regularly. He knows of the unit needs and concerns. He is the unit leaders Coach and most of all a friend. He offers encouragement and support.

With the literature available he helps the leader with new opportunities of improvement. He maintains a great relationship with the unit leadership.

He encourages participation in District and Council Events.

He works to have a strong unit Committee, by attending the committee meetings to see them in action. He uses the literature to help make the committee stronger, and works with the committee to help them solve problems and improve unit operations.

He keeps in touch with the Charter Organization of the unit he serves.

He meets with them and encourages charter representative. He meets with the head of the charter organization to explain the role the unit.

He develops a good relationship with the charter organization and the unit leadership. With the District Executive he thanks the Charter organization for using Scouting.

HE KNOWS THE NEIGHBORHOOD WHERE THE UNIT IS LOCATED. He participates in "Crossing Over" (transition) of the boys from cub scouts to scouting. He identifies sources for new members for the unit. He knows his charter organizations and prospective ones. He learns about characteristics of that neighborhood that might impact the unit.

He knows the District and Council;

He identifies resources that can help his units. He knows and shares information about scheduled events that will help the units. He works closely with the professional staff. He uses members of the District operating Committee to help meet specialized needs of his units.

He sets an example;

- a. He adapts an attitude of helpfulness.
- b. He keeps his promises.
- c. He is concerned about proper uniforming.

- d. He is diplomatic.
- e. He is a model of scouting ideals.

He must understand now that he is in the position of Commissioner. He becomes a model and he has to live up to that position. He has no choice but to do it.

He will continue to grow in scouting as a commissioner through training and experience, and working with other commissioners in other districts.

He is to make sure that the leaders of his units are going to Roundtable.

He is to assure that the proper technology is used to recruit new leaders.

He must make sure the units are registering on time. On time Charter Renewal is key, as well as following the proper procedures.

He should help by conducting membership inventory of adults and youth.

He should help the unit committee with the charter renewal meeting.

He should see that the charter renewal application is returned to the council service center.

He should present the renewed charter at the best time and place.

"None of these things can happen if the Commissioner has not had Training"

Trained leaders are the life blood of the Commissioners staff,

Starting first with Fast Start, Then Commissioner Basic Training but, remembers this just a start. Once the Commissioner has

this training the next step is to get experience by visiting the assigned units.

To refine this training The Commissioner College is the next step. At the college the commissioner can take a great variation of subjects to help him strengthen his knowledge of the Unit Commissioners role.

"TRAINING THAT IS NESSARY TO BE SUCESSFUL"

"GREAT COMMISSIONERS ARE TRAINED COMMISSIONERS"

"GREAT COMMISSIONERS ARE TRAINED"

Recruiting of new commissioners should not take place at places like a Roundtable, a Cub pack meeting or a troop general meeting. Pick the right place and time. Do not recruit in a place like I am about to describe.

When a person is asked to be a commissioner, we always hear some in the background say "you will only have to spend one hour a week", and the chuckles are heard. Then everyone in the group gathered to help you decide on taking the position will chime in with, "you're going to love being a commissioner it takes no time at all". All this is great fun but the person who is trying to decide on whether this is really what he/she wants to do could go away with mixed emotion about saying yes to your offer. This is not a good time to recruit a new commissioner there is just too much going on at a meeting.

The greatest success had by most Asst. District Commissioners or DC's is by meeting with the person to be recruited at their home or another quiet place, with no distraction. Asking potential candidate to take the job of commissioner, one must explain the time required, and if possible have his/her partner at this meeting so they decide together. This approach works, but most of all, tell them exactly what the job requires, the duties and how much time these duties will take.

Now, if at all possible have a fast start CD with you to show the person what to expect with the job of Unit Commissioner.

Next, within the next month get the new person to Commissioner Basic

Training. You probably have him out there calling on his/hers assigned

Units and without training it is just like sending a hunter out to get food with

no bullets in his gun. They need Basic training simply to be able to say, "I don't know the answer to a your question, but I will find out for you and get back to you by 0/0/00 and give a time of day or night".

Next they can go on line and download the additional instructional books available to add to their Scout Library. There is always a visit to the Scout shop to pick out the books that are important to help one succeed. Because of the changes in the literature it would be best to order them on line. I want to stress that changes have made some of the book carried at the Scout Shop out of date, this has made if hard on the scouters to get the latest information. It has made it most difficult for the scout shop since the material keeps changing and they could be stuck with the old books. There are web sites to visit, www.scouting.ogr, there one can download information such as; The Administration of Commissioner Service # 34502 (item needed) this book contains;

- 1. Commissioner Administration of Unit Service
- 2. Commissioner Basic Training Manual

I will include the list of literature that is available to all Scouters. The greatest problem you will have is all these books and other literature, are subject to change due to the many changes in the program.

The Commissioners Next Step in Training;

There are two Training Events that a Council might offer to the Commissioner, the Commissioners Conference and the College of Commissioners Service. Each program is held at least once a year, due to the fact the number of people required to put these programs together.

This council had used this first method for the Commissioner Training from 1985 to 2003. This program did a great job for that period of time.

This Council is now using The College of Commissioners Service for Commissioner Advance training.

A Commissioner can take three levels of training to earn a Bachelor Degree, Master's Degree, or Doctoral Degree of Commissioner Science. The Degrees have many different courses that one can pursue. For instance there are 23 courses in the Bachelor Degree Program. To earn the Bachelor degree a commissioner must take and complete 7 courses and this can be done in one day, but if they can only complete half the courses they earn an Associate's Degree that first day.

As you can see by the name of the subject each goes to the heart of the subject, simply because the instructors goes to great length to develop each course materials. UNDERSTANDING THE CUSTOMER --- "THE SCOUTER" ---

I have heard this said many times from many people, "TO DO A GREAT JOB IN WHAT EVER YOU'RE DOING, YOU HAVE TO LOVE WHAT YOU ARE DOING"!

This has been true down through the ages, and when you see a person with a big grin of his/her face during the work day you can see they must be very happy with what they are doing in life. This happiness carries over into their relationship with their family and friends. The experience I have had in the sales field proves this point time and time again, the successful sales person project this happiness in his approach to customer. His attitude is positive in the product he is selling, he has great faith in his product and he projects this positive ness to his customer. He wants to promote the product because he has the confidence knowing that this product will perform better than any other resulting in his sales climbing. This all started in being happy with what you are doing in life.

This is also true with being a Unit Commissioner; you have to love what you are doing. The Commissioner is dealing with all volunteers like himself.

They are in Scouting because they made the choice to be there, they are not paid to do this job they have chosen to do.

The Commissioner in many cases in dealing with people with the same likes, so it may be able to be they have the same goals (to see the Scouts succeeded). They each love the program, they want all the boys to move up in ranks, or to receive awards, to get out camping, to go to summer camp, to go to Philmont Scout Reservation, or go to a

National Jamboree. Each wants the best for the boys, and that makes it much easier in many cases for the relationship between Commissioner and Leader to work together for the Boys.

Marita Dittmer, First Dean of The College of Commissioners Science for the Dan Beard Council, Inc. states in her Thesis "Interpersonal Skills".

"We have to recognize the differences in people's styles of interacting with others", what are the strengths each person style brings to a situation".

These are the personal styles of the people a commissioner comes in contact with in his/her daily contact with the units.

In Scouting' we have to Ask, "Who are these people that you work with on a regular basis?" You do know—they include commissioners, Scoutmasters, Cub masters, Committee Chairman, committee members, parents, district committee members, district executives, and council committee members. IT is probably safe to say that we are not working with passive personality/management styles in our dealings with these people.

These positions in Scouting are leadership positions that require some management skills. If a commissioner is to be successful and effective to achieve a positive result he/she must understand the styles of these people. Note; these styles are how the individual is viewed by others not necessarily how they see themselves. Here is a list of the styles of people;

The analytical style—generally focus on the facts and logic, acts when the payoff is clear, and is careful not to commit too quickly.

The driver style takes charge, makes quick decisions, likes challenges, and focus on results.

The amiable style usually coaches and counsels, provide support, and communicate trust and confidence.

The expressive style usually creates excitement and involvement, and shares ideas, dreams, and enthusiasm.

The key for a commissioner is, "Did he/she hear them?" With all these styles there could be so much going on that he could miss the thing that is most important the thought that is could solve a problem!

I suggest a complete view of "Interpersonal Skills". Get a copy of Mrs. Dittmer's Thesis and go through it for a clear statement of relationships.

This is really important for new commissioners, taking the time to read this thesis will help them be successful in the future with their Units.

"LISTENING"—Why is Listening so important

"HOW CAN WE LEARN TO LISTEN WELL?"

'OPEN MY EARS LORD, HELP ME TO HEAR YOUR WORD'

Words from the song, "Open My Eyes" by Jesse Manibusan

"The words of this song are my reminder that I have to listen intently to the person talking"!

"Listening - "Open my mind Lord help me to see your Face"

"Open my ears Lord help me to hear your voice";

Are lines from a church hymn that really get to me each time I hear and sing this song at a church service on a particular Sunday. The line that is most striking to me is, "Open my ears Lord help me to hear your voice". This Song is something that kicks me, and asks the question did you really listen to what that Scouter said the other day? I think it is really requires that the mind and heart react to a scouter in this manner. We search back in our memory and ask ourselves these questions, how did we do, did I react properly in that last situation, did I get all the information, did help or did hinder the situation? It was all about the fact that we are questioning whether we listened properly or not.

The question of Listening started me thinking more and more about the importance of the word. It immediately brought to mind the training experience in my first years with John-Manville where I stayed for 35 years then took retirement. At that time NJ Bell and AT&T approached our company with the proposition that they could improve the Marketing and Sales Force with their Listening Skills. They claimed that we all when we used a telephone retained only 35% of the conversation, and they had a method to increase the percentage and bring our listening skills up to 85%. Naturally the company upper management was thrilled to see our listening skill improve to that great member of 85%.

This Telephone Listening course took 4 weeks two times a week for three hours at each session to improve our listening skills. Using a telephone and recordings, the information that was presented to each person was evaluated at the beginning of the

course and again at the end of the course. As it turned out the percentage of the group I was in had a 75% average to start with and 90% at the end of the course. The scoring varied greatly from one person to another and from one department to another department, but the company was happy with the results. They saw an overall improvement in all departments of the company.

As a result of this testing they did discover in the course, the hearing ability of some of the people was greatly lacking and these people were advised to check with a hearing specialist.

What did I take from this course? A greater awareness of the skill of listening, and the importance of getting all the information the customer has to give to me.

Listening again became a priority when teaching the Commissioner Basic training course especially the section about counseling. This statement hit home again with, "Listen to someone in such a way that they will solve their own problems."

<u>Listening</u> when used in the context of dealing with other scouters is, open your mind, your ears, your heart and concentrate on what the person is saying. Guide them in the discussion so that the end result is that they have come to the right conclusion by themselves.

After reviewing the other writers listed in the bibliography, all stress the importance of listening but, it is expressed by terms concentrate, be open to the story, express interest through body language, sit erect do not slouch, and other way to express interest in the story.

Reading these books gave me greater insight regarding the differences in the use of the term To Listen.

"COUNSELING' -This is what it is all about.

"NEVER GIVE THEM AN ANSWER"

"COUNSELING" – This is what it is all about. I thought long and hard about my choice of thesis. What subject, a great question, but even harder to commit to doing. I started strong in 2005 creating a power point presentation on the subject of counseling. I received fairly good reviews following the course but for some unknown reason I never till this July 2012 refined the material. Finally it is completed and having that done I was inspired to complete the thesis.

Knowing I am far from being expert on this subject and certainly not an expert in many other subjects I found it important to search out the information from those who are the experts in the field of counseling. A few of these experts gave me somewhat of a starting point such as, Wagner W. Dyer "Group Counseling".

Mr. Dyer subject of group counseling was quite interesting he expanded the process of getting the groups together by problem. Each group had a specific problem to solve which meant going through every last aspect of the subject. I am sure his approach to counseling would help with for instance a Town Meeting where an issue of importance could be decided. Mr. Dyer states in his book, "Good counseling is a process in which a person comes to a Decision, by themselves". Wow now I somewhat confused was he not writing about Group counseling or is it me did miss something here in his interruption. Is he talking about a one on one situation here a person comes to a decision on their own. Mr. Dyer whole book is about Group Counseling is it not the Group that supposed to make a decision? This is one example of opinion from an expert that has me more confused about the subject. I should be able come to a clearer understanding of the subject.

The other authors were equally as confusing in their explanations, and again some were right on the solution of problem areas. Many books have been written about marriage and divorce and I must take what have to say as being correct.

All of this research has brought me to the conclusion that I want to thank the authors of the first Commissioner Basic Training Manual who developed that information on Counseling. The counseling information that was developed many years ago is today the best for training commissioners. The counseling developed by the BSA is clear method of conducting a counseling situation to help a Scouter.

After all my research I could not find information on the subject of counseling came up to the standard set by the BSA. The Commissioners Basic course started the training, and then it is expanded in the Commissioners field book. The commissioners College Has a course on the subject of counseling called MCS 306 Counseling Skills. The Wood Badge Course of the 21st Century has Managing Conflict which replaced Counseling Skills in the Older Wood Badge

Course. I think that a review of how the counseling information in the Commissioner Basic Training is important just to demonstrate how it all begins for a new scouter.

The starting point of our Counseling training was with the "Commissioners Basic Training it gives all commissioners an introduction to the rudiments of counseling.

The counseling training that follows in courses and training are based on these simple principles. That is the reason I am including then in this thesis.

Counseling

"Listen to someone in such a way that they will solve their own problems."

What could be easier than that all we have to do to help someone is to keep quiet and let them talk?

Fundamentals of good Counseling

- 1. Pick a time and place with no interruptions
- 2. Understand what the leader is saying
- 3. Let the leader know you hear and understand
- 4. DO NOT GIVE ADVISE
 - Guide the discussion through questions
 - Let the leader solve his/her own problem
 - If they don't solve their own problem:
 - Give information
 - Propose possible alternatives
 - Let the leader pick the best
- 5. Summarize from time to time to keep on track
- 6. Support thinking with information
 - 1. Know the difference between information and advise

7. Resources:

- Commissioner Fieldbook, Counseling
- Train the Trainer, (Trainer's EDGE)
- Wood Badge, "Managing Conflict"

None of the Authors of the Counseling books I have read were as clear and easily understood as these lines above. The counseling does little to make all the points as those stated above. Again I commend the BSA for the work they have done to help train Commissioners in the skill of counseling. If a Commissioner Carefully follows the procedure laid out in the training success will follow.

I am delighted to have restated these counseling goals as prescribed in the Commissioner Basic Training Course.
