



DAN BEARD COUNCIL, BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA:

The Boy Scouts of America (BSA) provides out-of-school educational programs, facilitated by registered, background-checked volunteers, to kids from Kindergarten through 12th grade in community groups called “Packs” and “Troops.” Youth Participants are provided with up to 36 grade-specific classes annually, averaging 2-3 classes per month, covering a wide variety of topics aligned with the Ohio State Educational Standards. Unit Leadership who facilitate these lessons receive a combination of online and in-person training, including required Youth Protection training that must be renewed every two years.

Young people must register for these classes annually; youth who do not register do not have access to these classes, nor do they have access to additional optional events provided for registered participants. Registration for these classes is between \$85.50 and \$105 per youth annually; optional events are charged separately based on participation.

The Boy Scouts of America was chartered by congress in 1910 as an educational program, the only such charter in the United States.

Merit Badge "Micro-Credential" (Grades 6-12)

Scouts registered with a Troop also participate in a variety of independent, counselor-guided explorations into over 120 careers. Merit Badge Counselors are industry experts, are required to be registered and background checked, and receive training in program delivery and Youth Protection. Optional Experiences / Field Trips (Grades K – 12)

Registered Scouts are invited to attend a wide variety of optional activities and trips to further their learning. Some events feature specific focus (such as STEM or nature study) while others offer a variety of educational topics for Scouts to explore, all while having fun working with peers and trained adults.

STEM Activities: Scouts explore Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math in a variety of ways. Making racecars, launching rockets, and shooting arrows, Scouts learn physics and engineering; making boats and paddling canoes, they learn buoyancy; climbing a wall, they learn mechanical

advantage. STEM study is included in activities for Grades K – 12, offering age-appropriate lessons.

Career Exploration: Youth classes are offered several times annually, providing instruction by trained volunteers on one of over 120 topics, providing a “micro-credential” in subjects ranging from cooking and first aid, to personal finance, wilderness survival, welding, law, citizenship, and more.
